We have moved our office into **The Park School**, across West Market Street from the Downtown Mall. Our new location gives us close proximity to partnering organizations, such as McGuffey Art Center and Parks and Recreation. It also provides a highly collegial setting, as we now share our working space with other educators. Like us, The Park School is committed to reaching those children who might otherwise miss the opportunities our community offers.

### **A YEAR OF ACTION**

#### Workshops and other VSA Collaborations

We have enjoyed another year of working closely with VSA Arts Charlottesville/Albemarle. It has been a very busy year. In addition to our regular workshops, we have also assisted VSA Arts in the Development of a Resource Directory. In case you are not familiar with VSA Arts Charlottesville/Albemarle, it is a partnership that develops arts-based programs, activities and events for students and adults with disabilities. VSA Charlottesville/Albemarle is a member of the VSA Affiliate Network, a program of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

We have been very fortunate to have the opportunity to offer our enrichment programs in public schools and recreation programs for several years now with the support of VSA Arts. But it's not enough just to focus our own workshops, because there are so many other fantastic artists and instructors in the VSA network who serve our target populations. Just to name a few, and it's hard to pick among this impressive roster, recording artist and music therapist Cathy Bollinger, drama therapist Mecca Burns, poet and inspirational speaker Rose Williams, and visual artist Robin Hoffman.

Over the past several months, we have been working with VSA Arts to raise community awareness of the opportunities VSA Arts offers in our community. These talented artists and instructors are available to share their programs that include students with disabilities in Charlottesville and Albemarle schools at no cost to the school. #### **The Summer Inclusion Program**

The Summer Inclusion Program completed its fourth summer at Charlottesville Parks and Recreation/CLASS Summer Day Camps. This summer the program expanded from three to five Parks and Recreation sites. All elementary and pre-teen sites had a mentor in their program who was able to assist students and staff with simple modifications and accommodations in order to make participation in regular camps more accessible to children with disabilities. The Summer Inclusion Program is a collaboration with Camping for All and Charlottesville Parks and Recreation.

We have identified a few areas for further development in our Summer Inclusion Program, and one of the most critical areas is expanding our staff training to include regular staff, especially site directors in inclusion training. Currently, our mentors receive 12 hours of pre-service training on inclusion, but in a truly inclusive site, every staff member should be introduced to common disabilities and simple adaptive strategies. This year, we will focus much of our energy on developing and funding an expanded training program.

#### **Monumental Collaborations**

It is a joy to report that we have started a new Monumental Collaboration, this one at Jack Jouett Middle School. This, our third collaborative sculpture with McGuffey artist Ninni Baeckstrom, will celebrate the diversity of the Jack Jouett community, which serves students of a wide range of cultural and socio-economic backgrounds. As always, we are taking extra care to make certain that children with disabilities and struggling students are included in this project. In addition to students in Donna Evan's sculpture classes, (continued on next page)











students from Dina Baber's functional skills class have been involved in the project. The Monumental Collaborations Program takes children through the entire process of creating a site-specific sculpture, from designing the work, to pitching it to the school, funding the project, and on to the actual creation, completion, and installation of the work of art. This fall, students have focused on designing the monument and making mosaic hotplates which will be sold as a fundraiser. The students' mosaics will be on display and available for sale at a student art show at McGuffey Art Center in February. Please plan to attend our opening! Once we have raised funds through these art sales, grant-writing, and other fundraising activities, we will begin the construction of the monument. We will be looking for volunteers for fundraising, for the art show, and for the classroom assistance during the construction phase. #### The Hub

The Hub is a small program serving six children who came here seeking refuge from conflict in the world's troubled spots. The children and youth in this program have participated in our activities for many years. One came to us as a second grader who barely spoke English and is now a high school student. The Hub is a community-based mentoring program. We meet with our students every four to six weeks on Saturdays for enrichment activities. We believe that there is power in giving back, so as this group has grown older we have shifted some of our emphasis to community service. Currently we are working on the design and construction of a "tiny house" in partnership with Community Housing Action Teams (CHAT). This project perfectly combines enrichment, as the children research and design tiny houses, and community services, as they volunteer to help build this beautiful pod-like buildings that will be used to provide housing for low-income and elderly individuals.

### Spotlight: Summer Inclusion Through a Parent's Eyes

We asked a parent to talk about the Summer Inclusion from her family's perspective:

Thanks to the hard work of the Enrichment Alliance in collaboration with Camping for All and Charlottesville Parks and Recreation, our family was able to for the first time haves our son participate in camp for 2 weeks this summer. Our son has a developmental disability which has made finding any after school program willing to let him participate challenging often due to fact that staffing will usually not be sufficient to assist a child with special needs who has difficulty with communication. Therefore, he has often had to sit on the sidelines while his siblings are able to participate.

With their collaboration and training of mentors by Enrichment Alliance, Mary Anna was able to recommend and train a wonderful young woman, Brooke, who provided just the right amount of support. She met with us in advance to learn about our son and let him access the Camp EXL programs with the other campers with her support as needed. Her presence put the other staff at ease as well and gave us a contact person to see how the days went.

We found that our son would come home happy and would eagerly tell us at the dinner table about his camp with fun days at the pool and special field trips they went on, including a bus trip to Richmond to the Children's Museum. He was able to explore new things with other children, and now has a new interest in learning to play basketball. For his last week of camp, his older sister joined him and told us how she wanted to go to his CAMP EXL camp next year instead of other Charlottesville summer programs.

This experience would have not been possible for him in any other summer camp in Charlottesville. Thank you for making this camp a reality for our son and I hope this collaboration continues for 2015.
