

## **HIGHLIGHTS**


Approximately 760 children and youth participated in our programs and partnerships this year. Our activities included:

## A YEAR OF ACTION

#### **The Summer Inclusion Program**

It's now been five years since we piloted The Summer Inclusion Program at one day camp in Charlottesville. Today the Summer Inclusion Program serves five day camps, with a total camp population of about 650 campers. The Summer Inclusion Program is a collaboration between The Enrichment Alliance, Camping for All, Charlottesville Parks and Recreation, and Charlottesville City Schools¹ The program provides training, dedicated staff, adaptive materials, and other forms of support to help children with disabilities attend camp with their typically developing peers. We most often serve children with autism, intellectual disabilities, mood dysregulation, and ADHD. Generally, about 5-7 percent of the children at a given camp have challenges that require some support from our program.

#### **Goals for The Summer Inclusion Program Include:**

- Learn more about similar programs across the country, including visiting exemplary sites.
- Increase our collaborations with community support services to build a stronger network of support around participating campers.
- Expand the range of disabilities we serve.
- Create a restricted fund from which to draw for specific support needs on a case by case basis, such as use of a special needs bus or hiring a sign interpreter.

#### **Workshops and other VSA Collaborations**

The Enrichment Alliance is exactly that, an alliance, and we are at our best when we are working in close partnership with other likeminded programs, such as VSA Arts Charlottesville/Albemarle. VSA Charlottesville/Albemarle promotes and develops opportunities for art and creative expression for people of all ages and abilities, with a focus on serving individuals with disabilities. Our VSA partnership is an excellent example of how effectively alliances can work. Their mission is focused on opening opportunities for individuals of all ages to engage in the arts. Our mission is to open up enrichment opportunities in the sciences and humanities to children and youth. The two missions complement each other and the support of VSA over the years has greatly strengthened our capacity to provide art programming to children and youth. During the past year we have led VSA workshops at The Park School and The Ivy Creek School. We also had the privilege of being on the VSA strategic planning team. This year The Enrichment Alliance is also developing a new strategic plan and will be reflecting on how our goals can be mutually supportive.

#### VSA Strategic Goals We Are Excited to Support Include:

- Better serve a more diverse range of individuals interested in VSA programming
- Raise awareness of the full range of VSA programming, especially by reaching out to new audiences.
- Increase community awareness of VSA by enhancing the agency's visibility.

#### **Monumental Collaborations**

In partnership with McGuffey artist Ninni Baeckstrom and Jack Jouett art teacher Donna Evans, we are deep in the creation of our third site specific mosaic art work. The students, their teacher, and Ninni have designed a set of mosaics which will be placed over the school's entry. Jack Jouett has a highly diverse student body, and the school's welcoming climate is represented by a diverse array of glass mosaic flowers. Funds have been raised for the first of the two mosaics and work on that one is nearly completed. We are hoping to be able to complete the second mosaic during the spring semester. This is our third collaborative art installation with Ninni. You can see our completed projects at William Monroe Middle School and Charlottesville High School. One of the most exciting aspects of this project has been to have a Charlottesville High School graduate, who worked on the CHS project as a student, come back as a volunteer on the Jack Jouett project. No one's support could mean more to us than that of the adults we once served as students!

#### **Goals for Monumental Collaborations**

- Raise \$1300 for the completion of the second mosaic at Jack Jouett.
- Follow-up on the interest in the arts generated by this project through continued support of out-of-school time arts programing at Jack Jouett.

#### The Hub

When supporters look at the impact of non-profit organizations, they tend to look at large numbers, and unfortunately may focus more on quantity that quality. The Hub is by far our smallest program, offering monthly Saturday enrichment programming to six refugees from areas of conflict in Asia. Many of the children and volunteers in the program have been with us for several years, forging deep, lasting relationships. Our activities over the years have been eclectic: walking the Rivanna trail, making midwife kits for a Haitian clinic, art projects, gardening projects. We know that the research points to the value of these enriching activities, but truly there is more to this program than activities. There are conversations in the car about grades, about whether to take advanced classes, about planning for college, dealing with bullying. More than anything else though, I believe the Hub matters because these children, who have come here from the other side of the world, many of them from refugee camps, know that consistently, through the years, we have been here to welcome and encourage them. As we move forward in our strategic planning, we would like to look at how the intimacy of the Hub can be maintained while at the same time bringing it into the framework of collaboration that our other programs enjoy through strategic alliances.

#### Goals for the Hub

- Gradually transform The Hub into a program that helps under-served children access community programs, without compromising the strong relationships forged through our current model.
- Form a plan to address transportation concerns.

# **Looking Out Around Us:**

We've been spending a lot of time over the past year trying to understand how our programs fit in with the bigger picture. This past spring Mary Anna and Deb Shapiro of Camping for All attended the National Inclusion Projects Let's All Play Conference in Raleigh. They also paid visits to Parks and Recreation Programs in Hanover and Henrico Counties in the spring and summer. Since then Deb has been reaching out to other programs to learn more about their inclusion practices, while Mary Anna has been conducting a review of the literature on out-of-school time and inclusion. The space left in this report will not allow us to go into detail, beyond saying what we have learned thus far has validated the need for inclusive, enriching program during and outside of regular school hours but also has suggested that access to enriching activities is not equally available to all children. We have learned that all over the country, and in other nations as well, programs are trying some of the same ideas we have been employing in our programs. In the coming year, we hope to focus on connecting with other similar programs, because by building on each other's experiences and ideas we can all strengthen our capacities to open out-of-school time learning to all children, regardless of ability, income, language barriers, or geographic barriers.
