A YEAR OF ACTION

Maybe the teen-ager is wary of this new land, wondering if s/he is welcome here, but the monument in the school courtyards answers empathically, "You BELONG." A child with Down Syndrome who is gifted in the visual arts has an opportunity to develop her talents alongside her typically developing peers under the guidance of two of our community's highly gifted visual artists. Children in functional skills classes participate in an interactive concert with non-disabled music students. Refugees spend their Saturday morning on a service project. These are some of the things that have happened in our community through the efforts of The Enrichment Alliance and our supporters.

Monumental Collaborations

Our Charlottesville High School Monumental Collaboration was installed in October, 2012 with the help of



Charlottesville High School English Language Leaners, Ellen Vigor's Functional Skills class, The APO Service Fraternity of UVA, and an incredibly devoted committee of volunteers. This was the culmination of several years of work by Ninni Baeckstrom, CHS students and our volunteers. We were proud to be joined in celebration by Dr. Rosa Atkins, superintendent of schools, and to be graced with the beautiful music provided by Seth Swingle on Kora. This art project served the entire community of Charlottesville High School. Although the focus was on immigration and the sculpture was designed by English Language Learners, the work was done during the lunch hour and all students were welcomed to take part. The project was completed by youth born in this county, youth who had only recently arrived from all around the globe, many of them from the world's most troubled places, youth with disabilities and youth without disabilities, volunteers from the community. The work that was done on this monument surely is embodied the

design of the sculpture itself: hands of different hues, upholding a globe that is grounded in a circle of flags representing the nationalities of the students who participated. We are extremely grateful to the support of VSA Arts Charlottesville/Albemarle, to Art in Place, and to the volunteers on the Monumental Collaborations task force who made this happen!

The Summer Inclusion Program

Our report on Summer Inclusion this year will cover two summers. The summer of 2012 occurred in traditional fiscal 2013, summer 2013 fell in our short year. In fact, a desire to be able to report on the most recent summer was one of the primary reasons for changing the fiscal year. It is exciting to look at these two summers together, because it shows how much this program is growing. In the summer of 2012, we served 210 students at two Parks and Recreation sites. In the summer of 2013, we served 379 students at three Parks and Recreation sites as well as at Live Arts and Pathfinders summer programs.

But what does that mean? It means that three Parks and Recreation day programs and the two smaller specialty programs had mentors on-site to assist with the inclusion of children with special needs. It meant that children were able to enroll in camp who would otherwise have been unable to be enrolled and that children were able to stay in programs that would otherwise have been unable to accommodate them. It meant programs ran much more smoothly because of the assistance available for the struggling campers. As one site director told me, "Many years about half the day was spent on behavior issues. This year we didn't have very many at all. A lot of my day was able to be devoted to general duties instead of dealing with discipline issues." It means that all campers were able to enjoy the benefits of diversity in a well-supported environment.

Workshops



We have continued to enjoy sharing a variety of workshops throughout the community. Space does not allow me to describe them all in detail, but I would be remiss if I did not mention how wonderful it was to experience the magic shared by Mecca Burns and Post-High actors in their annual Festival of the Book From Page to Stage Performances. The young people brought to life some of the beloved tales of The Arabian Nights, which happens to be one of my own favorite collections of fairy tales. In addition to from page to stage, our Saturday workshops continued at the Hub, serving refugees from Asia with the help of a group of energetic, fun-loving, ready for

anything mentors. Mary Anna also continued taking her workshops into schools and Parks and Recreation programs. Special guests at these workshops included perennial favorites Kim and Kimbo Cary and our new discovery, storyteller and drama teacher Susan Phillips. Our deep appreciation goes to VSA Arts Charlottesville/Albemarle, to The Virginia Commission for the Arts, and to the Community Theater Advised Fund of the Charlottesville Community Foundation for their support. Not to mention our volunteer mentors!

All students benefit when children with special needs are allowed to participate with typically developing children of the same age. Inclusion fosters acceptance and teaches children how to find what is similar in those who are initially judged to be "different." It recognizes that everyone has their own strengths and needs, and that with proper planning and flexibility, bringing together diverse populations can yield wonderful results. - The After-School Corporation

STILL AHEAD

Summer Inclusion Ends Pilot Study. Full Throttle Forward!

This summer marked the completion of our three year pilot study of the summer inclusion program. The results of the study have been very positive. We have moved into a deeper level of collaboration and resource sharing with our partners, Charlottesville Parks and Recreation and Camping for All. We were also delighted to partner with smaller specialty programs at Pathfinders Art and Nature Camp, Live Arts, and Woodworking with Judy Cahill, opening up a broader array of choices to children and youth with disabilities. I am very happy to report that this project will continue over the coming years, and as capacity to support them also grows, will expand to support more children and children with greater levels of need.

Get Involved

Three years of very generous grant funding have enabled this partnership to flourish, but now it is time to move The Summer Inclusion Program from a grant-funded to a self-sustaining program. During the United Way's Lawrence E Richardson Day of Caring, a volunteer task force from The Department of Defense spent a morning putting together a wonderful slide show for us to take into the community to spread the word about this program. We need:

- Someone, or a team of someones, to help us finish this almost complete slide show. Marketing and video editing skills would be a plus.
- Suggestions and contacts for places to take our slide show on the road.

Workshops

On Saturdays, about once a month, we provide workshops for a small group of children who are refugees from areas of strife in Asia. We would like to integrate these children more into the community and increase their access to the highest quality of instruction available in our community.

Get Involved

There are a couple of ways you can help with this:

- Help us find scholarships at local Saturday enrichment programs, especially in art and engineering.
- Volunteer as drivers and chaperones to assist with transportation.

Also for our workshops, we are looking for:

• Planters suitable for use in winter outdoors container gardens.

We have a couple of schools interested in projects, and we are currently exploring our options. Both projects represent very exciting ways to reach some of our most under-served communities, and I hope over the next two or three years we can actually do them BOTH.




FINANCIAL BREAKDOWN
